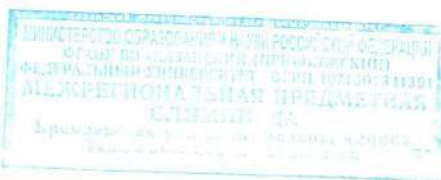

## Be yourself!

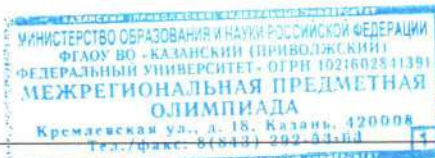
