Languages

Talking is the most common way for us to communicate, but the language we use can depend on where we live, who we're talking to and what we're trying to say. Some languages are spoken widely, and some are spoken by only a few people. There is even a language called Silbo Gomero spoken on La Gomera of the Canary Islands that's made up entirely of whistles!

There are roughly 6,500 spoken languages in the world today. However, about 2,000 of those languages have fewer than 1,000 speakers. If you were able to learn a new language every week, it would still take you 125 years to learn all 6,500!

There are lots of languages spoken around the world, but the most common first language is Mandarin, with more than 1,000,000,000 people using it as their main language. Most of those are in China and Taiwan, but Mandarin is quickly becoming a common second language for people to learn. You may even know a few words already!

Spanish and English are the next two most popular, with English being used as a way for many different countries to communicate. For example, when French people do business with people from Belgium, they'll usually use English when speaking to each other. It's also the common language for pilots from around the world, they use it when talking to airports or each other over the radio.

Some countries have one official language that almost everyone speaks, while other countries might have two or more main languages. At least half the people in the world speak more than one language. In Canada, for example, French and English are both national languages, and many areas speak both fluently. Here is a fun fact about Canada. The name Canada comes from the word 'kanata' which means 'settlement' or 'village' in the language of the indigenous St Lawrence Iroquoians.

Some languages have a lot in common, and that's because many years ago they came from a common parent language. For example, the Danish, Swedish, Norwegian and Icelandic languages are all similar as they were once part of the ancient Germanic region. Just like the Latvians and the Lithuanians were once Baltic people. Overtime people started pronouncing similar basic words differently. So if you know, one language, it can be a little easier to learn another one from a similar language family. You may surprise yourself at how quickly you can pick it up.

We learn our first language as children, but learning a second language can be difficult. If you want to learn a new language, the best way is to have someone to practice with. If they

know the language, that's even better. If not, you can practice together. This is also great when you're travelling. Try to use the local language whenever you can, you'll get better at it very quickly, and the locals will appreciate the effort.
